#### Storm Preparedness

Spring storm season is here. Like other emergency services providers, PPS stays ready to respond at any time to weather related outages. We encourage you to be prepared, too.

**Storm Kit**: People who rely on electrically powered medical equipment for survival should have a backup power supply or a plan for getting assistance with their medical equipment. It's also a good idea to keep a storm kit that includes: bottled water, bleach for sanitation purposes, non-perishable food, a manual can opener, batteries in various sizes, flashlights, matches, non-electric portable heater, prescription refills, baby wipes and hand sanitizer, a car charger for your phone, cash, disposable camera to document damage for insurance (in case your phone cannot be charged) and a written list of important phone numbers, including insurance and medical contacts.

Generators: Generators should be tested regularly. An improperly used generator can be deadly to homeowners and utility workers. Never try to power your house wiring by plugging a generator into a wall outlet or attaching it to your breaker box. This is known as "back feeding" and creates an electrocution risk for line crews working nearby and neighbors served by the same transformer. The only recommended method to connect a generator to house wiring is to have a qualified electrician install a power transfer switch.

**Outage Map:** Our webpage, paducahpower.com, contains information that may be helpful to you during an outage. Click on the "Outages" tab at the top of the page, and you will find information about our restoration process, generation safety and our outage map. You can use the map to see reported outages and to follow our progress.

### **Spring Safety**

Each year, thousands of people end up in the emergency room with injuries from mowers, trimmers, power saws and ladders. As you begin spring cleaning, keep the following tips in mind:

- Check cords and outlets for fraying or exposed wiring on all electrically operated equipment.
- Don't use electric mowers on wet grass.
- When using ladders, look up. Note the location of overhead power lines.
- Avoid using a metal ladder near electrical sources.
- Always assume overhead power lines are energized and dangerous.
- When moving a ladder, always lower it and carry it horizontally.
- Follow the 1:4 rule—for every four feet you have to climb move the base of the ladder one foot from the wall.

#### **Climbing Hazard**

Spring cleaning often results in yard sales. Signs pop up on utility poles on a regular basis. Be aware that tacks, nails and any other metal fastener placed on a utility pole can be a hazard to our linemen. Linemen wear special gloves. A small pinprick in their gloves can cause injury or even death. They also us sharp spikes to help them climb poles. A slipped spike can cause a fall.

If you are planning a spring project that involves digging, you should first make a free call to Kentucky 811. Digging without a call could result in injuries, legal problems, interruption of utilities or project delays. Dial 8-1-1 at least two full business days before you dig.
